For those of you who are new to the North Forty Community and have not had the pleasure of meeting the "Chairman of The Board", let me tell you a little about Bill DeWolf.

Bill and his wife, Jenny, have lived in Trinity Center since 1991. The decision to move to Trinity Center, say's Bill, was prompted by the population sign at the outskirts of Vacaville where they were living. When it reached 88,000 they decided it was time to move on. Bill said they looked at various locations in Trinity County and decided on Trinity Center on the strength of the Sheriffs Report in the Trinity Journal.

Bill was born on March 1, 1937 in Chelsea Massachusetts, and joined the Air Force when he was 17 where he spent the next 20 years working as a propeller mechanic and an electronics technician. After retiring from the Air Force, he went to work in the civil service at Mare Island, California helping to overhaul nuclear submarines. After 28 years in federal service, Bill retired a second time at the age of 52. In Trinity Center, Bill became known as a self employed all around handyman.
