As you will read below, the CCVFD Chili Feed and Auction is coming up. This is one of my favorite local events and I look forward to it every year. Chief Roger Chatterton wrote the following regarding this event. If you like auctions, chili, being with friends and/or supporting a local effort, you'll love this evening.

As I hope most readers know, the Coffee Creek VFD Chili Feed and Auction is coming up on Sat, April 21, starting at 5 PM. I would like to take this opportunity to explain why we have this chili feed, what it does for your Coffee Creek VFD, and what it does for all of you.

There are fifteen volunteer fire departments in Trinity County. Five of those have tax bases. Coffee Creek VFD is not one of those five. Thus, we have to depend on donations and fundraising events to pay the expenses of running the fire department.

The annual budget for operating the fire department is right around \$30k, which is also approximately what we are able to generate, so the budget is extremely tight.

Whenever we can we apply for grants for necessary equipment, and over the years we have been very successful at this. Unfortunately there are no grants to fund the day to day operating expenses of the department so our only choices are to ask the district residents to vote to tax themselves, close the doors, or try to solicit the support of the community through donations and fund raisers. Fortunately this community has been very supportive over the years so we have never had to consider either of the other two options.

Earlier on I stated I would explain the benefit of all this to you, so here we go. Trinity Center VFD and Coffee Creek VFD respond together on all calls, as well as training together. The mutual response is to ensure we have sufficient resources to handle whatever the emergency is. We train together so we function as one team when we handle calls. Two of our members are in fact members of both departments. If you are anywhere north of Cedar Stock and you call 9-1-1 for a fire, rescue or medical emergency we are going to be there for you, 24/7. That is our commitment. If the 9-1-1 call is a medical emergency we will treat you and transport you in one of our ambulances, either to meet Trinity County Life Support, or, in more critical emergencies, to Trinity Center Airport (Swett Field) to be transferred to a medical helicopter. We are very proud of being able to deliver this level of service to you and each one of us. We are all unpaid volunteers and dedicated to continuing to do so.

But, to do so we depend on you for your financial support. So we want to take your money. But, in return, you'll get a great meal (although I may be biased since my bride is the chief chili cooker), have the opportunity to bid on some very cool stuff and have a great evening visiting with friends and neighbors. Supporting your Coffee Creek Volunteer Fire Department can't get any more painless than that. I hope to see you all there!

Let's keep the spawning Bass in the lake where they belong!

Dr. Koby will be recognized at the Nor-Cal EMS Pre-Hospital Conference in Redding on April 28<sup>th</sup>.
