PRAYERS ARE BEING ASKED for Sue and Roger Chatterton's 13 year old granddaughter who is gravely ill from a toxic reaction to a prescribed medication that contained sulfa. Only 1 in a million people are affected by this reaction, and they are usually senior's. The sulfa creates burning from the inside of the body outwards, causing blisters to form, and eventually causing the skin to peel away. Sterling is in a Santa Clara Burn hospital where they have been able to reduce her 106 degree temperature to near normal and stabilize her in critical condition with her body covered with bandages from head to toe. The name of the syndrome affecting Sterling is called "Steven Johnson Syndrome" and those affected with it are in extreme pain. Sterling has been placed in an induced coma to relieve her of the pain and give her body time to heal. The family asks that the phone calls be restricted and visitors limited to close family members. Sue is working on a "Caring Tree" where she will be able to send updates via email. If you wish to be included, please email your email address to me and I will forward it on to Sue and Roger.

Richard and Winter Biggers gave birth to a 7 pound 13 ounce baby girl measuring in at 19 inches long.
